Intro to B&W Photography

- 1. Convert to B&W
 - if colors do not contribute to the message of the picture;
 - if colors distract from the message of the picture;
- 2. The mood of a B&W picture is influenced by the style (low key, high key, etc.), tonal distribution and separation of tones (contrast);
- 3. Previsualize: while you compose the picture, see the finished print (Ansel Adams);
- 4. Good B&W pictures are characterized by rich tones;
- 5. The drama is in the sky (the drama is in the red filter): Ansel Adams and others;
- 6. Traditional B&W filters (contrast enhancing filters): yellow, orange, red, blue and green;

Composition

- Same as for color pictures: Rule of Third, leading lines, highlights to draw attention, etc.
- 2. Volume (3-dimensional), shape (2-dimensional), line (1-dimensional) and surface texture ===> cityscape and still life;
