Fellner advocates for creativity, originality and uniqueness

For photographer and architect George Fellner, creativity, originality and uniqueness are the most important tenets in photography.

Fellner, who juggles two professions – architecture and photography – these three tenets are the key to communication through photography. Speaking in a Zoom session with members of the Springfield Photographic Society on Sept. 22, Fellner addressed the topic of a mindset for creative photography.

And he believes no type of photography should take precedence over another for the photographer.

In his presentation, Fellner displayed landscapes, macro photography, travel, portraits and architectural subjects, among others. His goal: to create a dialogue with the viewer.

After graduating from Boston College, I was working at the




Massachusetts

State House when I learned I wouldn't be getting the promotion I had hoped for – they brought in some kid from Springfield to take that job and his name was Tim Ryan (now my husband).



Frank Smith's take on architectural photography

Architecture and the art of graphic elements is the specialty of Frank T. Smith and he discussed these at length on program night Aug. 25.

Smith draws on the works of Margaret

Bourke-White, M.C. Escher, Walker Evans and his grandfather Frank Fehn for inspiration.



Composition, design, perspective and post processing are key elements in architectural photography, said Smith, a self-taught Pennsylvanian who specializes in travel, landscape, architectural and philanthropic images.

He also emphasizes depth of field, ensuring that focus is sharp from front to rear in a photograph. He uses a full complement of lenses from fisheye to wide angle to telephoto (to compress the scene).

His work takes him from urban decay to sparklingly new buildings, both interior and exterior.


The problem with urban decay, he said, is access. It's not always easy to gain access. And older buildings can be dangerous so safety is a priority.

While going wide with many photos, Smith also emphasized looking for details and he finds them even in puddle reflections. "If there's a puddle, I'm always looking for it," Smith said.

He will combine several images to get the best dynamic range from lights to darks in a scene.


It's important to include the horizon in outdoor architecture photography, Smith said. Leading lines are a useful tool as well.

Smith said he seeks out dilapidated buildings to record them for posterity before they are torn down.

Black and white can be used effectively to focus on composition.

And Smith urged SPS members to not stop after shooting a subject from one perspective. "Seek new perspectives," he said, because they can open the door to a better angle and lighting.

Smith uses Lightroom Classic to adjust visual perspective and he suggested shooting the building wider than you might think necessary to correct keystoning in post processing.

Perhaps his favorite was macro shots of crystals and



other minerals. He said he frequents mineral shows such as the ones at the Eastern States Exposition and Tucson, Arizona, in search of fascinating stones.

When shooting portraits, he often employs a variety of props to creatively seek out the unique

personality of the subject.

To make tall urban buildings more interesting he puts the structure on a diagonal to make it appear more dynamic.

Composition is also critical to a good photo, said Fellner, a resident of East Haddam, CT. Experiment with different crops, from vertical to horizontal to square. Make sure to crop out, either when shooting or editing, distracting background elements, he said.

Fellner, who is currently focused on abstractions involving macro photography of stones and crystals, has had his work published in books, journals, travel guides and magazines. His website is:


