Nguyen demonstrates how to shoot low-light photos

Paul Nguyen steps out to shoot photos when many people are thinking of going to bed.

Nguyen, a landscape photographer whose travels have taken him around the world, spoke about low light and night photography to the Springfield Photographic Society via Zoom on Jan. 26.

The 30-year veteran of photography explained how he makes compelling images when there is little or, in some cases, no light. Northern lights, starscapes, moonscapes and even wildlife are among his subjects.

Nguyen uses a variety of techniques including slow shutter speeds, low ISO settings and, depending on circumstances, wide open or shut down apertures.

Very slow shutter speeds will show eddies in water, something that can't be accomplished with shorter speeds, he said. Long exposures flatten choppy water to create silky water images which are impressionistic or even abstract, he said. They also simplify composition by removing visual elements and make the scene appear calmer than it was.

It's important to get the focus correct, he said, and that is accomplished during the day when the photographer can see the subject. When the focus is set, you can hold the focus by placing a small bit of tape on the lens to prevent a shift.

It's best to focus to about five feet into the landscape for the best depth of field, said Nguyen who has served in

the prestigious National Parks Artist in Residence program, at Petrified Forest, Arizona. His work also includes an exclusive assignment as the photographer for the Gallery on the Charles River at the Museum of Science, Boston. In 2019, he was featured as an affiliated artist at the School of the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston.

If the goal is to shoot star trails, locate the North Star, which is stationary, and place it in the center of the shot. The other stars will rotate around the North Star, creating pleasing rings. A variable neutral density filter is a great tool to darken the landscape, allowing long exposures even during the day. The best gear and settings include a tripod, a remote shutter release, the lowest ISO setting, aperture priority or manual exposure, a small aperture and manual focus in an overcast, shaded or dim landscape.

A common subject is the Milky Way. In this case, Nguyen recommends using the fastest wide-angle lens (24mm or wider) in your kit, setting it open to f2.8 or more, an ISO of 3200 and exposing for about 20 seconds. Camera settings can be adjusted to find "different paths to low-light glory," Nguyen said. Sometimes it's necessary to increase the ISO to as much as 3200 and sometimes the shutter speed must be quickened to capture a scene. Other settings are then changed to make up the difference, he said.

When very long exposures are required, Nguyen recommends using the bulb setting to manually operate the shutter. Also, shoot first with a high ISO to create a proof and then lower the ISO for the final image. Starlight exposures are best when the sky is clear with low humidity and there is no moon and no light pollution. Limit exposures to 30 seconds or less, use the largest f-stop, manual focus to infinity, and use ISO 3200 or 6400.




